Is a Donor Advised Fund Right for You?

There are few financial planning strategies that provide the advantages of a donor advised fund: flexibility of asset donation, professional fund management and personal involvement in philanthropic distribution, all at a fraction of the cost of a private foundation.

Contributions to a donor advised fund are tax deductible in the year they are made. In 2021, one can donate up to 100% of adjusted gross income, mitigating a tax burden in the case of a significant increase in taxable income.

Donor advised funds also provide estate planning benefits. Contributed assets are not subject to estate taxes. Donors can also use their annual gift tax exclusion to make contributions to their fund. And since assets in an invested donor advised fund grow tax-free, they can create a lasting legacy.

We are pleased to report that the Jewish Community Foundation administered approximately \$22,584,000 in assets in its 2020-2021 fiscal year. This is an increase of more than \$3,716,000. In addition, we have received promises of over \$2,250,000 through planned giving.

We distributed \$2,305,000 to a multitude of charities—almost \$305,000 more than last year – through donor advised funds, a valuable vehicle for people to use to contribute to their favorite charities.

This year, the Foundation contributed \$320,000 to the Federation's annual campaign. Those funds helped improve the lives of so many people and institutions in our community—synagogues, educational groups, agencies and organizations that

promote our traditions and values.

I suspect that Alex and Linda are peering down from above and feeling extremely proud. Alex steered the Foundation for the first seven years as chair of our board of directors. He planted the seed and spearheaded the raising of our initial meaningful dollars. The assets under management at the Jewish Community Foundation of CNY have recently surpassed 20 million dollars.

The dream of Alex, Linda and other leaders is continuing to flourish. This past year, about 25% of the annual Federation campaign was the result of monies disseminated from permanent endowments at the Foundation. In addition, many thousands of dollars have been generously distributed from donor advised funds to a wide range of worthwhile causes within the Jewish community as well as many other charities locally and around the world.

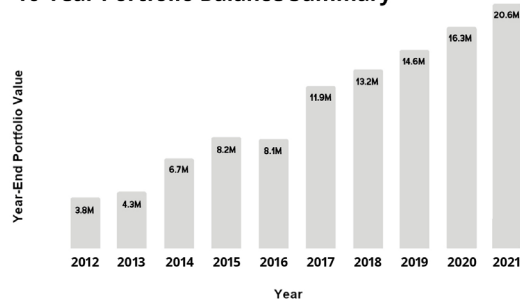

Fiscal year 2021 was unlike any other year in the Foundation's history. It was a year of COVID, a scourge that killed more than 3.5 million people worldwide and over 600,000 in the United States. It was also the year the US stock market hit record highs in a boom that was not only twice as long as the average, but also the longest in American history.

The Jewish Community Foundation of Central New York likewise hit an all-time high, with more than 20 million dollars invested in our accounts. As a result, the Foundation was able to contribute a record-setting \$320,000 to the Federation's campaign, accounting for fully 25% of the campaign achievement. The foresight of our founders has come to fruition.

But even as we stand on the shoulders of giants, we must master their wisdom and move beyond it. We must follow the example they set for us and continue to grow our Foundation so that the future of our Jewish community will be secured. We cannot stop and rest on our laurels or coast along thinking things will always be good. Just as our Foundation's Investment Committee examines our portfolio performance meticulously and in great depth on a regular basis, we too must examine how our Foundation attracts and serves fundholders.

We know that our community is aging and shrinking, but we also know that young people are moving into or back to Central New York. The life experiences and expectations of younger generations are very different from those of us who remember life before cell phones, social media and Zoom, before there was a State of Israel. But those who believe in the importance of Jewish life, not only now but forever, must continue to work to make it happen. As we look to younger generations whose priorities are diverse and changing, it's crucial that we, the leaders of today, take action now to protect the future of Jewish life. The broad variety of legacy giving opportunities at the Foundation empowers all of us to assure that the causes and community institutions we care most deeply about will thrive for future generations.

The resurgence of antisemitism in America and around the world is a reminder that, while we pray that the horrors of ghettos, concentration camps and death camps are in the past, as Jews, we must be ever vigilant and must, to a certain extent, rely upon our own initiatives and strengths to secure our future.

As we look forward to 5782 and fiscal year 2022, our goal will be to increase the number of funds in our Foundation that will assure the continuance of needed services for the Jewish community provided by Federation. We will seek ways to increase the number of PACE funds both from individuals and from the community, through the Community PACE fund. It is only by working to achieve this **today** that we can assure that there will be a vibrant **tomorrow**.

The most important thing you can do while you're here is to ensure the world will be better when you're not. One of life's great achievements is the ability to leave a lasting legacy. That's what our Foundation is all about.

Who has a Donor Advised Fund?

Donor Advised Funds represent a unique opportunity to participate in the grant-making process. Funds can be opened with a minimum gift of \$2,500 and can be named for the donor, the donor's family or as a memorial to a loved one. Donors recommend grants (\$100 or more) to the charities of their choice. Family members can be named to succeed the original donor as advisors to the fund in perpetuity. The Foundation currently manages \$6,537,000 in Donor Advised Funds.

Unrestricted Endowment Funds

Endowment funds can be restricted to benefit a single synagogue, agency or organization or can be part of the Foundation's Unrestricted Endowment Fund for disbursement to meet the greatest future needs of our Jewish community.

Only the income of an endowment fund is disbursed annually; the principal is left intact and invested for growth. Permanent funds are the safekeeping our Jewish community needs to ensure its future.

Endowment funds may be established with a minimum gift of \$10,000. These funds are invested for growth through the careful financial management of professionals and the oversight of the Board at the Jewish Community Foundation of CNY.

Carol Berendt Memorial Fund

To honor the memory of their mother, the unrestricted fund was established in 2012 by Carol's children.

Solly and Belle Cohen Fund

Fund established in 2012 from the remainder of their Donor Advised Fund as an unrestricted endowment fund.

Amy Devorsetz Eliezer Fund

An unrestricted fund established in 2018.

F.L. Putman Foundation Fund

One of the endowment's first funds, the out-of-town donor felt compelled to support the newly formed Jewish Community Foundation with an unrestricted gift.

Sam Pomeranz Fund

One of the endowment's first funds, the trustees of the Sam Pomeranz Trust, Sheldon and Mateele Kall established this fund to provide for needy CNY Jewish agencies.

Abe Shankman Fund

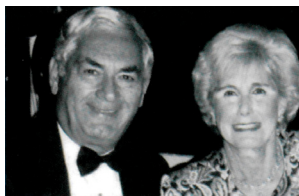
Established in 2012 to help support the Federation's annual campaign.

An unrestricted fund established in 2006.

Dr. Marshall established his unrestricted endowment before his death in 2004.



Elliott Meltzer Fund
His support for the Federation is a permanent testament to his generosity.



Myrna Rubenstein Fund
Myrna established this unrestricted endowment fund in keeping with her charitable intent.



Lillian Spector Fund
Established in 2017, a generous gift was made as unrestricted support to the Foundation's endowment to benefit the entire Jewish community.



Warren Wolfson Fund
Established in 2014, this unrestricted endowment fund was made a permanent gift to the community.

Perpetual Annual Campaign Endowment (PACE) Funds

PACE funds are the safekeeping our Jewish community deserves so that future generations will have a vibrant and fulfilling Jewish life. The principal is left intact as endowment and invested for growth. PACE funds require a minimum gift of \$10,000. The funds are invested for growth through the careful financial management of professionals and the oversight of the Board at the Foundation. PACE Funds benefit agencies, organizations, programs and synagogues throughout the Jewish community.

This has been an extraordinary year for your Foundation. Assets that participate in our investments have passed the 20 million dollar mark for the first time. The portfolio returned 26.69% for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, growing from \$16,300,000 to \$20,573,354. The portfolio return was the largest annual gain in the history of this foundation.

Vanguard continues to manage the majority of the assets using a straight index approach. They manage 60% of our assets in a portfolio consisting of 70% equity index funds and 30% in bond funds. They rebalance quarterly. American Funds manages 35% of the portfolio in their mutual funds. These funds are currently tilted toward "value stocks" and are currently weighted in 75% equity funds and 25% in bond funds. The balance of the portfolio is held in bank accounts, money market funds and a short term treasury note. The overall combined asset allocation at the end of the fiscal year was 68% in equities 26% in bonds and the balance in cash.

The total fees to manage these assets is remarkably low. Vanguard charged us .19% as a fiduciary fee and .06% in fund fees, for a total of .25%. The total fees charged by the various American Funds averaged .64%. These average out to .34% in total management fees. This low expense ratio and the Investment Committee's decision to avoid alternative assets and other high fee investments have been key to our very favorable performance versus other foundations of similar size.

Our committee meets regularly to assess market conditions, review our asset allocation and monitor the performance of our asset managers. Vanguard and American Funds send representatives to meet with us twice annually to offer their insights, discuss their respective portfolio strategies and help inform our asset allocation decisions. Vanguard has also provided an annual study which highlights how the Foundation's portfolio is performing against our peers.

The Investment Committee is made up of local business leaders, attorneys and investment professionals with a broad range of experience in the financial markets. Committee members include Neil Bronstein, Neil Hoyt, Victor Hershendorfer, Bill Pearlman, Lynn Smith, David Horowitch, Sheldon Kruth, Mark Field and Allen Galson.

Directors' Centennial Fund

The Directors' Centennial Fund was established by members of the Foundation's Board of Trustees to provide long-term financial support to the Jewish community of Central New York through the end of the 21st century.

Current and past board members made commitments to fund the community, over and above PACE funding, on both an immediate and testamentary basis. The initial goal of \$2.5 million was successfully achieved and subsequent goals were also met, so that the fund now has \$4-5 million in assets.
